OCTOBER 5, 2020

The regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Angola, Indiana was called to order at 7:00 p.m. at the Angola Training Center, 306 West Mill Street 1B, with Mayor Richard M. Hickman presiding. Council Members Gary L. Crum, David A. Olson, Kathleen G. Armstrong, David B. Martin, and Jerold D. McDermid answered roll call. No Council Member was absent. Clerk-Treasurer Debra A. Twitchell recorded the minutes.

Among those present were Chief of Police Stu Hamblen, City Attorney Kim Shoup, Deputy Clerk Ryan Herbert, City Engineer Amanda Cope, Wastewater Superintendent Craig Williams, Water Superintendent Tom Selman, Economic Development and Planning Director Vivian Likes, Fire Chief TR Hagerty, Assistant Fire Chief Bill Harter, Building Commissioner Scott Lehman, Human Resources Administrator Sue Essman, Patrol Officer Mike Wood, Patrol Officer Evan Howe, Detective Darrin Taylor, Firefighter Hillary Cope, Firefighter Paul Thiel, Fire Lieutenant Kevin Mory, Fire Captain Pete Decker, Police Sergeant Trent Crooks, Dispatcher Lisa Freed, Dispatcher Tish Covell, and Patrol Officer Max Essman.

Also, among those present were Ashlee Hoos of *The Herald Republican*, Colin Meadowcroft of WLKI, Jill Smith with Steuben County Department of Child Services, Steuben County Economic Development Corporation Director Isaac Lee, and Walter J. Krohn.

REMARKS BY THE MAYOR

Mayor Hickman recognized Patrol Officer Howe, Patrol Officer Mike Wood, Dispatcher Tish Covell, Police Detective Darrin Taylor, Jill Smith with the Steuben County Department of Child Services, and Dispatcher Lisa Freed for an incident on June 18, 2020. A 911 caller reported children were left in a vehicle in the Walmart parking lot. The day was hot with a temperature of 90.2 degrees. Patrol Officer Howe responded to the scene and found all windows were rolled up and two children inside the vehicle. Howe broke the vehicle's window and removed the two children, ages two and three. The children were crying, their hair was wet, and faces were red. Howe put the children in his air-conditioned patrol car and then located the children's mother inside Walmart with a six-month old infant. Patrol Officer Wood immediately started to pull Walmart video and determined that the children were left in the vehicle for 37 minutes. While the mother was interviewed at the Police Department, City dispatch was turned into a daycare center. Dispatcher Covell began to take care of the children while dispatching. After working his eight-hour shift, Detective Taylor was called in to interview the mother. Howe and Wood took turns responding to calls and answering phones while Covell attended the children and dispatching. Jill Smith with the Steuben County Department of Child Services was called to assist with the case. Smith had been working since 8:00 a.m. that morning and was not on call for the evening but stayed with the officers in dispatch until 11:00 p.m. to interview the mother and make arrangements to get the children to a safe place. Wood used his own money to buy food for the children and used his computer for cartoons to entertain the

children. Dispatcher Freed arrived at 7:00 p.m. for her shift, immediately took one of the children and after five minutes of rocking, the child was fast asleep in her lap. After her shift, Covell remained at the police department just to help officers and Freed take care of the children. Freed, Covell, and Smith took the children to the bathroom, changed diapers and rocked the children to sleep. Detective Taylor interviewed the mother for almost two hours. If it was not for the actions of all the officers and dispatchers, these children might not be with us today. It shows how the members of the Angola Police Department come together as a team in a time of need. Plaques were presented to those involved.

Mayor Hickman then recognized Patrol Officer Max Essman, Fire Captain Pete Decker, Fire Lieutenant Kevin Mory, Firefighter Paul Thiel, and Firefighter Hillary Cope. On March 9, 2020, dispatch received a call of a man down at the VFW. After arriving on the scene and determining the man was not breathing, Patrol Officer Essman began CPR and continued to do so until the Fire Department and EMS arrived. The departments worked together to provide life saving measures on the patient. The patient was transported to Fort Wayne where he made a full recovery and is home in Angola doing well. The City receives calls like this on a weekly basis and its not always the case that the outcome is successful. Each of these employees showed professionalism and compassion in saving the life of a fellow citizen of Angola. Mayor Hickman then invited Walter Krohn to the podium to speak and present plaques to those involved.

APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES

Council Member Olson moved to approve the September 21, 2020 minutes. Council Member Crum seconded the motion. The motion carried 5-0.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Ordinance No. 1651-2020, AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CITY OF ANGOLA, INDANA EMPLOYEE HANDBOOK, EMPLOYMENT POLICIES – EQUIPMENT, TOOLS AND MACHINES, was read by title and presented to Council on third and final reading. Council Member Olson moved to approve. Council Member Armstrong seconded the motion. Discussion followed. The motion to approve on third and final reading carried 5-0. (add crash vehicle data recorder review)

NEW BUSINESS

At 7:17 p.m., Mayor Hickman declared open the public hearing for the proposed 2021 Budget. There being no public comment, the hearing was considered closed at 7:17 p.m. Ordinance No. 1652-2020, ORDINANCE FOR APPROPRIATIONS AND TAX RATES, was read by title and presented to Council on first reading. Council Member Martin moved to approved. Council Member Crum seconded the motion. The motion to approve on first reading carried 5-0.

Ordinance No. 1653-2020, AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE ANGOLA MUNICIPAL CODE INVESTMENT FUND ACCOUNT CHANGING THE

APPOINTMENT OF MEMBERS, was read by title and presented to Council on first reading. Council Member Olson moved to approve. Council Member Armstrong seconded the motion. Discussion followed. The motion carried 5-0. (AMC 3.10.120)

Resolution No. 2020-786, A RESOLUTION OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ANGOLA, STEUBEN COUNTY, INDIANA APPROVING THE DEDUCTION FROM ASSESSED VALUATION FOR THE INSTALLATION OF NEW MANUFACTURING EQUIPMENT ALL LOCATED WITHIN AN ECONOMIC REVITALIZATION AREA WITHIN THE CITY OF ANGOLA, INDIANA, was read by title and presented to Council for approval. Steuben County Economic Development Corporation Executive Director Isaac Lee described the abatement. The new equipment will be used to manufacture PPE (personal protective equipment). Council Member Martin moved to approve. Council Member Crum seconded the motion. Discussion followed. The motion to approve carried 5-0. (Angola Wire Products, Inc, 803 Wohlert Street)

John Julien with Baker Tilly presented schedules for the proposed water and sewer adjustments to rates and charges. There are challenges with the sewage works. The day to day operating costs have increased revenue requirements. There is a gap of about \$560,000 per year or 22%. There are matters that still need study including operating costs and the capital budget going up in a meaningful way. There are potential regulatory issues which still need to be evaluated, therefore, adjusting rates is essential. A definitive sewer rate increase is too early to determine. Consequently, a 9% increase is recommended to eliminate part of the gap until other questions are answered and other matters addressed. The Water Utility Cost of Service Study supported the idea of an actual rate restructuring meaning modifications to change what class of customer is paying what. recommended to move forward with the water rates and charges adjustment consistent with the Cost of Service Study. Regarding the fire protection hydrant rental fee paid from the General Fund, during the last 20 years, municipalities have gravitated from property tax to a utility user fee. Julien recommended moving that charge to the customer over a threeyear period for a total increase of about \$9. There would be a larger impact on large users. In summary, Julien recommended that water rates be adjusted proportionate to the Cost of Service Study, sewer rates increase 9% across the board, and fire protection services moved from the General Fund to a monthly customer service fee. Discussion followed. Wastewater Superintendent Williams shared again with Council the chlorides regulatory issue and the possibility of pursuing a site-specific limit with an unknown cost. The alternative is reverse osmosis with an estimated cost of \$10 to \$15 million which would also impact operating costs \$250,000 to \$500,000 per year. It is an extraordinarily complicated issue with no viable solution. Discussion followed. Julien will work with City Attorney Shoup on the rate ordinances.

CLERK-TREASURER AND DEPARTMENT HEAD REPORTS

Economic Development and Planning Director Likes noted Angola Wire Products, Inc. consented to a 3% fee collected to one or more public or nonprofit entities established to promote economic development within the boundaries of the City.

APPROVAL OF ACCOUNTS PAYABLE VOUCHERS

Council Member Martin moved to approve the Allowance of Accounts Payable Vouchers 48034 through 48219 totaling \$638,956. Council Member McDermid seconded the motion. The motion carried 5-0.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE ANGOLA MUNICIPAL CODE INVESTMENT FUND ACCOUNT CHANGING THE APPOINTMENT OF MEMBERS

BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED by the Common Council of the City of Angola, Indiana that Title 3 Revenue and Finance, Chapter 3.10 Funds is being amended by the text of existing provisions in this style type, additions will appear in this style type, and deletions will appear in this style type:

- Section 1. Section 3.10.120 Investment fund account is amended to read as follows:
- (A) Establishment. In accordance with IC <u>6-3.5-7-13.6</u>, the city hereby establishes the city investment fund account pursuant to the terms and conditions of this section.
 - (B) Governing Board Membership.
 - (1) The city investment fund account shall be managed and administered by a governing board. The Governing Board shall be comprised of at least five members but in no event more than seven members and, until amended by the city's Common Council, the initial Governing Board of the city investment fund account shall be comprised of five members. The initial members of the Governing Board shall be appointed by the following entities:
 - (a) The Mayor of the city shall have the authority to appoint one **two (2)** member(s) to the Governing Board; provided, however, that in the event the Governing Board is comprised of seven members, the Mayor of the city shall have the authority to appoint two members to the Governing Board.
 - (b) The Common Council of the city shall have the authority to appoint two members to the Governing Board; provided, however, that in the event the Governing Board is comprised of seven members, the Common Council of the city shall have the authority to appoint three members to the Governing Board.
 - (c) The county Economic Development Corporation shall have the authority to appoint one member to the Governing Board.
 - (d) Elevate Ventures, Inc., a state not-for-profit corporation, shall have the authority to appoint one member to the Governing Board.
 - (2) Each member of the Governing Board shall have at least five years of experience in business, finance, or venture capital, and each member appointed to the Governing Board shall be required to certify to the appointing entity or office that such member possesses the requisite experience required by this section.
 - (3) The membership of the Governing Board shall be established on a bipartisan basis such that the number of the members of the Governing Board who are members of one political party may not exceed the number of members of the Governing Board required to establish quorum.
 - (4) A majority of the Governing Board constitutes a quorum, and the concurrence of a majority of the Governing Board is required to authorize action,

including, without limitation, the grant or loan of any funds from the city investment fund account.

- (C) Funding. The fiscal body of the city may deposit, through appropriations, the following funds into the city investment fund's account:
 - (1) Taxes distributed to the city under IC <u>6-3.5-7</u> et seq.;
 - (2) Funds received and maintained by the city under the state's local major moves construction funds under IC <u>8-14-16</u> et seq.; and
 - (3) Proceeds of public or private grants.
- (D) Administration of Fund Requirements for Grants and Loans. The terms for the administration of the city investment fund account shall be established by the Governing Board and set forth in bylaws which shall require the submission, review, and approval of the state Economic Development Corporation and otherwise include, at a minimum, the following criteria and provisions:
 - (1) That the membership and composition of the Governing Board be in accordance with the terms and requirements of this section.
 - (2) That the expenses of administering the fund shall be paid from money within the fund.
 - (3) That the city investment fund account shall be subject to an annual audit by the state Board of Accounts.
 - (a) That the policies, procedures, and criteria under which the Governing Board may loan or grant money from the city investment fund account shall be in accordance with the provisions of this section and shall be set forth in investment fund policies and procedures and confidential application form (the "policies and procedures") attached to Ordinance No. 1445-2013 and incorporated herein by reference, which may be updated, revised, and amended from time to time by the Governing Board. (b) That the Governing Board may loan or grant money from the city investment fund account to any private or public entity in accordance with this section, the policies and procedures, and upon a finding by the Governing Board that the loan or grant is for an economic development project as defined in IC 6-3.5-7-13.1(c)(1) or 6-3.5-7-13.1(c)(2)(A) through 6-3.5-7-13.1(c)(2)(K) and will otherwise be used by the borrower or grantee for at least one of the following economic development purposes:
 - (i) To promote significant employment opportunities for the residents of the city;
 - (ii) To attract a major new business enterprise to the city; or
 - (iii) To develop, retain, or expand a significant business enterprise within the city.
 - (c) That the expenditures of a borrower or grantee of money from the city investment fund account must be dedicated, committed,

and used by the borrower or grantee for	or any of the following
economic development projects and pu	urposes:

- (i) Research and development of technology;
- (ii) Job training and education;
- (iii) Acquisition of property interests within the city;
- (iv) Infrastructure improvements;
- (v) New buildings or structures located within the city;
- (vi) Rehabilitation, renovation, or enlargement of buildings or structures located within the city;
 - (vii) Machinery, equipment, and furnishings;
- (viii) Funding small business development with respect to prototype products or processes, marketing studies to determine the feasibility of new products or processes, or business plans for the development and production of new products and processes.
- (E) Dissolution of Fund. In the event of the dissolution of the city investment fund account, and upon payment or making provisions for the payment of all liabilities incurred prior to any such dissolution, all of the assets, funds, property, and monies of the city investment fund account shall revert and be assigned to the city.

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING RATES AND CHARGES FOR USE AND SERVICES RENDERED BY THE SEWAGE WORKS OF THE CITY OF ANGOLA, INDIANA, AND AMENDING THE ANGOLA MUNICIPAL CODE

WHEREAS, the City of Angola ("City") has heretofore constructed and has in operation a sewage treatment facility for the purpose of collecting and disposing in a sanitary manner the Sewage Works of the City;

WHEREAS, Indiana Code 36-9-23 provides that a municipal legislative body shall, by ordinance, establish just and equitable fees for the services rendered by the Sewage Works;

WHEREAS, the Common Council finds that based upon the advice of its financial advisor, the existing rates and charges are insufficient to enable the City to property operate and maintain its Sewage Treatment Works facility, pay debt service on its bonds, and fund additions and improvements to the system;

WHEREAS, the existing sewage rates and charges are set forth in Ordinance No. 1599-2018 adopted on December 3, 2018 and as codified in the Angola Municipal Code, Title 13 Public Services, Chapter 13.10 Sewer and the Common Council finds that it is necessary to amend such Ordinance No. 1599-2018;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ANGOLA, INDIANA that the Angola Municipal Code, Title 13 Public Services, Chapter 13.10 Sewer is being amended by the text of existing provisions in this style type, additions will appear in **this style type**, and deletions will appear in this style type:

Section 1. 13.10.380 Sewer rate schedule is amended to read as follows:

(A) (1) Rate. The Sewage rates and charges shall be based on the quantity of water used on or in the property or premises subject to such rates and charges as the same may be measured by the water meter there in use, except as otherwise provided in this chapter. Sewage service rates, based upon the amount of water used and the location of the user, shall be as follows:

Location of User

Sewer Service Rate per

1,000 Gallons per Month

Within city corporate limits

\$9.48 \$10.33

Outside city corporate limits

\$11.85 \$11.26

- * Users outside the city corporate limits shall be billed at 114.9 percent of the rate billed to users inside the city.
 - (2) Minimum Charge.

(b) The minimum charge for sewer services where the user is not a metered consumer shall be based on the size of the water service connection, but in no event shall the charge be less than the corresponding monthly minimum water meter charge set forth.

- (B) Users outside the city corporate limits shall be billed at 114.9 percent of the rate billed to users inside the city.
- (C) Connection Charge.
 - (1) New Connections. The connection charge shall be collected from each new customer prior to connection to the Sewage Works system. Each new connection shall pay a connection charge in an amount determined by the following schedule:

- (2) Authorization to Waive Charge. The Board of Public Works is authorized and empowered, in specific instances for such areas as cemeteries, golf courses, and parks, to waive, modify or defer in whole or in part the connection charge.
- (3) Receipt of Connection Charge. One hundred dollars of the connection charge shall be receipted to the wastewater operation and maintenance fund and used to properly operate and maintain the Sewage Treatment Works facility. Any connection charge balance shall be receipted to the wastewater improvement fund and used for additions, improvements, and extensions.
- (4) Remonstrance Restriction. Any and all owners of real estate, persons or corporations, their or its survivors, heirs or assigns, who shall connect to the Sewage Works system, pursuant to this article, shall agree in writing prior to the connection to waive their rights to remonstrate against annexation by the city.
- (5) Conflicting Provisions. All provisions of water and sewer main construction ordinances of the city shall remain in full force and effect and shall coexist with this article. New customers seeking service shall be charged the greater of the charges or fees. In addition, this article is exclusive of any private water and sewer line construction agreements.

- Section 2. Section 13.10.420 Surcharge provisions is amended to read as follows:
- (A) Surcharge Based on Waste Concentration. Each industrial user who discharges industrial wastes into the public sewers shall be subject to a surcharge, in addition to the regular sewerage service charge, based on both the biochemical oxygen demand (or on the chemical oxygen demand where CBOD cannot be determined) and the suspended solids content of the wastes, if these wastes have a concentration greater than the following:
 - (1) A carbonaceous biochemical oxygen demand (CBOD) in excel of 200 mg/L; or where CBOD cannot be determined, then, in lieu of CBOD, a chemical oxygen demand (COD) in excess of 400 mg/L;
 - (2) A total suspended solids (TSS) in excess of 250 mg/L;
 - (3) Phosphorous in excess of 10 mg/L;
 - (4) Ammonia in excess of 20 mg/L.
- (B) Surcharge Computation. The surcharge shall be determined as follows:
 - (1) The excess pounds of BOD, COD, phosphorous, TSS and ammonia will be computed by multiplying the customer's billing sewage volume, measured in units of 100 cubic feet for the current billing period, by the factor of 0.0062321, and multiplying that product by the difference between the concentration, measured in milligrams per liter, of the CBOD (or COD), phosphorous, TSS, and ammonia respectively in the customer's sewage and the allowed constituent.
 - (2) The allowed constituent will be determined by multiplying the excess pounds of each constituent by the rate of surcharge set out in subsection (C) of this section.
- (C) Surcharge Rate. The rate of surcharge for each constituent shall be as follows:
 - (1) For carbonaceous biochemical oxygen demand (CBOD), \$0.12 \$0.13 per pound;
 - (2) For chemical oxygen demand (COD) where CBOD cannot be determined, \$0.12 **\$0.13** per pound;
 - (3) For total suspended solids, \$0.12 \$0.13 per pound;
 - (4) For phosphorous, \$3.63 \$3.96 per pound;
 - (5) For ammonia, \$0.36 \$0.39 per pound;

(D) Surcharge – Review. As appropriate, the city shall evaluate the treatment costs for removing CBOD, COD, TSS, phosphorous and ammonia from the wastewater treatment plant in order that the Board of Public Works may determine whether the current rates or surcharges charged for excess pollutant loading charges to industrial users are adequate or should be changed.

Section 3. 13.10.450 Waste haulers is amended to read as follows:

- (A) The eity Wastewater Superintendent may accept waste from commercial waste haulers including port-a-john waste, septic tank waste, car-wash grit and sediment, and other waste deemed appropriate by the Superintendent, for disposal by the city wastewater treatment facilities. The Superintendent, or his or her designees, shall not accept any material outside the pH range of 6.0 and 9.0 or any material that he reasonably believes to be hazardous chemicals, oil, grease, or any material potentially harmful to the treatment plant.
- (B) The rate charges to the person or entities whose waste is accepted for disposal \$0.085 **\$0.10** per gallon.
- (C) The Superintendent is authorized to establish the forms, policy, and procedure to implement this section.

Section 4. Effective date.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect January 1, 2021 after passage and adoption by the Common Council and approval by the Mayor.

WHEREAS, the Common Council finds that based upon the advice of its financial advisor, the existing rates and charges are insufficient to enable the City to properly operate and maintain its Waterworks facility, pay debt service on its bonds, and fund additions and improvements to the system; and

- (5) Collection or Deferred Payment Charge. All bills for water services not paid within 20 days from the due date thereof, as stated in such bills, shall be subject to a collection or deferred payment charge of 10 percent on the first \$3.00 and three percent on the excess over \$3.00.
- (6) Temporary Users. Water furnished to temporary users via a hydrant meter shall be charged in the same manner as any other metered account as set forth on the schedule of metered water service. The cost of installing and removing the temporary connection shall be \$50.00 and payable at the time of the hydrant meter

- deposit. If the hydrant or hydrant meter is damaged, the user shall be billed the cost of repairs.
- (7) Pool Fill. Services connected with the filling of a swimming pool, including water consumption, shall be charged \$150.00 if 20,000 gallons or less and shall be payable in advance. If greater than 20,000 gallons, the charge shall be \$150.00 plus the cost of metered water in excess of 20,000 gallons.
