2023 ANNUAL REPORT

The Angola Economic Development & Planning department dedicated its efforts to the improvement of operational efficiency and service quality, in order to deliver unparalleled customer satisfaction, promote expansion prospects, and optimize resource utilization. As such, the department worked meticulously to streamline its functions, collaborate with other departments through project planning and review.

The Team

Brett Steele, a dedicated City Planner, collaborated with developers and residents to execute projects that involve the Board of Zoning Appeals and Plan Commission. In this role, he guided applicants through the application, plan review, legal notice, and public meeting processes and monitored on-site activities to ensure adherence to plans. With a focus on providing exceptional customer service, Brett is driven to foster smart community growth. Moreover, Brett also aided as Mayor's Assistant when Tammy retired midway through the year.

As a Permitting Coordinator, Retha Hicks played an integral role in management of projects from initial contact to completion. Her commitment to excellence and diligent work ethic enabled her to see each project through to completion. In addition, she too provided assistance as Mayor's Assistant. At the beginning of 2024 Retha became Executive Assistant to the Mayor.

Mackenzie Bird joined the team in April as the Community Coordinator and immediately began working with the existing Angola Main Street Board of Directors to implement the Main Street program governed by the Office of Community and Rural Affairs (OCRA). Her efforts resulted in the addition of new board members, new programs, and a stronger relationship with OCRA to further solidify Angola as a Main Street Community.

Lastly, Jennifer Barclay, the Director, worked to recognize untapped resources available through the Economic Development Commission and the Redevelopment Commission for the City of Angola. Collaboration with community members, she pursued a comprehensive solution to address the Childcare Crisis, update the Downtown Master Plan, amend Title 18 of Unified Development Ordinance.

Planning and Project Realization

Staff held numerous pre-project meetings throughout the year with developers. Staff is quick to include other departments such as Engineering to give developers a full scope of the processes. Most projects have come to fruition and are under construction to date. Staff continue to bring the other projects along in varies stages of ideation, financing, etc. Staff focus heavily on providing exemplary customer service to developers and taking the time to intimately understand their projects to better guide through processes. Two notable projects championed by Staff is Angola Downtown Master Plan and Update to Title 18 UDO. The master plan was a community wide effort including Trine University, Steuben County Community Foundation, Cameron Memorial Community Hospital, Steuben County Tourism Bureau and Steuben County Economic Development Corporation to come together and plan the future of Downtown Angola. We boast of robust public input and steering committee meeting participation. The master plan truly was a community concerted effort and vision. Additionally diligently reviewed Title 18, UDO to streamline processes and respond to the needs of our residents and developers within the built environment.

Permitting

Staff continued to work streamlining the permitting process from beginning to end. It is imperative to keep in mind the main purpose of zoning regulation via issuing permits is the general welfare of the community. This is accomplished through the protection of property values, lower public costs and enhancing livability.

Historic Preservation Commission

In 2023, the Historic Preservation Commission (HPC) accomplished several notable initiatives to enhance the historical charm of our community. Four downtown businesses received facade grants to support improvements:

- Joppa Cosmetics: Replaced signage due to rebranding and installed lights on the front facade.
- Lee Williamson (Building owner): Replaced a damaged front door of Joppa.
- ROCO Hair Shop: Replaced front windows.
- Jenny Lou's Greenery: Updated signage and installed a new front door at their new location.

Additionally, in 2023, the HPC approved crucial facade enhancements at 45 S Public Square and 65 S Public Square. At 45 S Public Square, HPC authorized the replacement of an awning on the back of the building. Simultaneously, at 65 S Public Square, safety concerns were addressed as a hazardous railing was replaced, new awnings were mounted, and new signage was installed. Moreover, a new downtown business (Bigalow Build & Design) assumed the former Jenny Lou's Greenery location at 223 W Maumee St, contributing to the area's revitalization by installing fresh signage and painting their front door.

While these projects contributed to the preservation of our local heritage, there were some challenges and areas where progress was limited. HPC was tasked with providing ideas for staff to assist with developing work plans for the year – the projects to date have not been developed. Talks of reintroducing guided tours or establishing a website were discussed, but no concrete steps were taken.

In September, Community Coordinator Mackenzie Bird attended the Preserving Historic Places conference, sharing ideas and examples with HPC. Unfortunately, these insights have yet to be translated into tangible projects. Staff is continuing to develop a partnership between HPC and Angola Main Street, aligning with their shared mission of historic preservation.

As HPC looks ahead, there is a need for vision, guidance and support. Staff will look to newly elected Mayor Martin to provide direction and assistance in shaping the future endeavors of HPC, ensuring the continued enhancement and preservation of our community's rich history.

Univertical

Amend R2019-7666 tax abatement to increase the amount of Personal Property that was eligible to be abated from \$4,100,000 in Personal Property to the actual amount of \$8,600,000. The original proposal to the addition of two new jobs and Univertical has already achieved adding these two new positions.

Development Projects

Staff continued to work with interested developers in the area. This included meeting touching base on existing project plan, work on financing assistance, grant procurement etc. Projects continue focusing on providing workforce housing to fill the vacant job within Steuben County.

Annexation

Staff worked with Don Wise and his father to annex the approximately 78-acres property west of Loves Travel Stop. The Wise's wish to develop the property with commercial along US20 and residential south of US20.

Community Development

Angola Main Street

The advantages of collaborating with Angola Main Street (AMS) were thoroughly explored by the staff, recognizing its status as a National Affiliate and State Accredited Main Street under the Office of Community and Rural Affairs (OCRA). Council gave its nod for the establishment of a Community Coordinator position in 2022, with the aim of ensuring the longevity of the program. This individual has been working alongside the AMS Board of Directors and Committees. Mackenzie's efforts have included the successful implementation of Meastro (OCRAs Reporting

Program) for all events and activities, as well as the addition of new board members. She has also contributed towards creating and enforcing policies and effectively implementing the 4-point approach.

Early Childhood Learning Taskforce

Early childhood care has long been identified as a need of Steuben County. In 2022 staff worked with a regional taskforce - which developed in a local early childhood taskforce. Spearheaded by a consultant contracted by Ambassador in 2023 the taskforce worked on governance and the housing of a dedicated staff person. The goal was to have a dedicated person working in Steuben County on expanding childcare capacity, increasing the quality of that care, connecting industry with providers as a talent attraction. The taskforce through open community dialog explored current systems, programs that exist locally and regionally. It was determined that Steuben Community Foundation staff will continue to represent Steuben County and the region and state explore system wide solutions. We expect significant efforts at the state level to address this issue in the next year.

Make My Move Program

Mayor Hickman initiated the Make My Move program with a grant to provide relocation assistance to entice remote workers to Angola. The goal would be for those remote works to bring trailing spouse and dependents to fill vacant jobs and classrooms. In December we received our first mover!

Marketing

Branding / Play Book

In 2022 with the support of the mayor, staff initiated a branding effort which is the first step in marketing the City of Angola to the state, region, nationally and beyond. The city engaged the services of LINKS Creative Alliance to streamline our logo and create a playbook that could be implemented across all platforms at the city. Unfortunately, the project came to a screeching halt with opposition from within. Mayor Hickman decided to turn over the project to the incoming Mayor. This included the overhaul of the city website.

Communication

In 2022 staff initiated a social media and email campaign, with the support of the Mayor Hickman. Staff worked to create a 'voice' on social media to clearly communicate information. Additionally, staff crafted a style to improve engagement. Emails range from monthly newsletters, bulk collection reminders, department announcement, city events, park and recreation updates etc. Social media post mimic emails include shares of supporting organizations, highlights of programs or community events, etc.




